International Criminal Law - No Genocide

Incitement to genocide is recognized as a separate crime under international law and an inchoate crime which does not require genocide to have taken place to be prosecutable. Genocidal intent. Under international law, genocide has two mental (or mens rea) elements – the general mental element and the element of specific intent (dolus specialis). The general element refers to the whether the prohibited acts were committed with intent, knowledge, recklessness, or negligence.

The 1948 Genocide Convention has become a vital legal tool in the international campaign against impunity. Its provisions, including its enigmatic definition of the crime and its pledge both to punish and prevent the 'crime of crimes', have now been interpreted in important judgments by the International Court of Justice, the ad hoc Tribunals for the former Yugoslavia and Rwanda and various domestic courts.

Genocide in International Law by William A. Schabas

As defined by the Genocide Convention, the crime of genocide is: [] committing a prohibited act [] with intent to destroy, in whole or in part [] a protected group, as such. The Genocide Convention, ratified by BiH, Croatia and Serbia², obligates states to prevent and punish the crime.

Under Art. 25 (3) (e) of the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court, a person who "directly and publicly incites others to commit genocide" has committed a crime against international law. Notably, there is no explicit requirement in this subsection of Art. 25 that genocide actually be committed.
